Pastor's Page-August 2024

¡Bienvenidos! And ¡Hola! from San Raymundo, Guatemala:) [Mission trip reflections from Danielle Dadisman]

Eleven checked bags full of dental supplies and one four-and-a-half-hour crazy drive through the mountains later and we finally made it to the dental clinic compound in San Raymundo! It was only sixty miles away from the airport in Guatemala City, but traffic was no joke. We landed around 3:30pm and didn't make it to the compound until 8pm.

Starting Mindset to help myself: Never be afraid to ask for help or acknowledge you are feeling out of your comfort zone. Grow in

confidence by watching and doing - nothing is going to happen if you don't step in and "Do Something."



I started by assisting my classmates. I wasn't confident in seeing someone by myself. Once I worked up the courage to see someone, I wasn't confident in doing what they needed. So, I had to ask for help. It was hard that night and the next. All I could see when I closed my eyes were all the ways I had messed up that day or what I should have done. I kept comparing myself to my classmates who had more training than me and how confident they looked while they saw patients. It wasn't until the second or third day of clinic that I realized they were just as scared and inexperienced as I was in treating patients. Once I realized this, it kind of leveled the playing field in my mind. My confidence started to grow, and I felt as if I could definitely do a cleaning or a simple filling to start out. By the end of the week, I was confident in doing triage, looking at the big picture and deciding what each person actually needed for treatment besides their chief complaint and the reason they came to see us in the first place. Once I completed triage and one of the dentists came and checked my work, I would carry out what I had suggested to the dentist and the patient as a treatment plan. I got to do two silver fillings, around five composite tooth-colored fillings, and pulled three teeth on my own with one of the dentists coaching me each step of the way. The people we served were incredibly patient and so thankful once we were done with their treatment. Some people stayed the entire time we were open from 8am until 6pm or 8pm on some days just to be seen and get all the work done they needed. It was hard to see how far gone some people's teeth were. There were maybe three people out of all that I saw whose teeth were very healthy. In total, we saw around 144 patients not counting those that came back multiple days! We did 140+ fillings both silver and tooth-colored fillings and pulled around 150 teeth. We did five or six cleanings, one root canal, and applied silver diamine fluoride (SDF) in quite a few patients to stop decay in teeth we weren't able to treat because of time.

Thanks for letting me share, and thanks for the prayers!

Offering for Jason Otten, Teach Beyond, August 17-18



Church History shared by the St. John's History Committee

GROUPS AFTER 1950

St. John's has been the inspiration for, and host to, many social, educational, and service groups. This list is some of the ones we know of which were started after 1950. There are likely other groups which we have overlooked. If you have more information about any groups mentioned here, or not mentioned here, please let the history committee know. Dates given are for known operation and may not be accurate for start or end year.

Girl Scouts were active by the 1950's but started before then.

Methodist Men's Club started in 1953. One project was to help raise funds for the new Asbury Church building in Bett. At times they had joint meetings with Asbury and Grace Methodist men's groups. This group was a local branch of a national Methodist organization.

Mother's Day Out- started about 1967. It was a chance for stay-at-home mothers to get out of the house.

Mothers' Study Club is known to have been active in 1967.

Camp Fire Girls is known to have been active in 1968.

Adult Fellowship Club- started in 1969 for retired and soon to be retired couples.

Day-Care Center was started in 1970. This was a child care service for working mothers. We also had a **Head Start** preschool program located here for a while.

Quilters was started by Winifred Peterson and Eloise Metcalf and is known to have been active by 1973.

Wesley Men- a group which was known to have been active in 1981.

Eager Beavers started about 1983 as a group of people who meet to assist the church custodian in the upkeep and repair of the church building.

Bridge Club- Church Secretary, Willa Wells, and Keith Cudmore, a member volunteer who was setting up the church's first computer system, were the starting force about 1987. The group first met in the church parlor and later moved to Ridgecrest.

Singles Adult Ministry/Single Adults Ministry (S.A.M.) started in 1988.

Recyclers are known to have been active in 1990.

Threads of Love create lap rugs and shawls for shut-ins.

St. John's Orchestra- there has been more than one incarnation of a group with this name. The one directed by Michael Green started in the fall of 1994. It was a group of musicians of all ages and abilities who appreciated the chance to play band/orchestra music together.

First Responders was a group of people who made contact with first-time attendees.

Befrienders was a group of people who visited members in the hospital.

Purse Ministry and Baskets of Joy Ministry benefit The Center's Street Team and members with extended illness or recovering from surgery, respectively, with the help of Linda Jantz and her co-workers.

Tender Loving Care is a group of people who keep contact with homebound members.
